Digital Citizenship

Overview: (Grade Level 9th thru 11th grade; Subject English; Topic digital citizenship) Starting this year, my students will be participating in reading and responding to nonfiction and fiction text; as well as to their peers writing responses using online programs; such as: Blogs, Google Drive and Docs, and/or Google +. With this instructional method comes much responsibility in terms of appropriate and professional online behavior. Therefore, this lesson is aimed at encouraging my students in beginning a discussion about what that entails. They will watch a YouTube video in class on Digital Citizenship and following the video the students will take a Google Form quiz to assess their understanding of Digital Citizenship.

<u>Materials:</u> Time scheduled in the writing lab, projector, Google Form: <u>Digital Etiquette Quiz</u>

Instructions:

Step 1: Think/Pair/Share "What is digital etiquette"?

Step 2: Play the YouTube video "Digital Citizenship".

Step 3: Students will take a Google Form Quiz.

(S) d. I can critique the effects of cyber-bullying. (R) e. I can demonstrate safe online communication practices regarding personal information (e.g. social network sites). (S)

Benchmark 5: The student can share data and information ethically and appropriately.
