IRLA Level

IR readers can:

- · Know and apply phonics and word analysis skills when decoding words
- · Recognize and read irregularly spelled words
- Read a IR text with sufficient accuracy and fluency
- Ask and answer who, what, where, when, why, and how questions to demonstrate understanding

While working in this level. IR readers learn to:

- Recount stories, including fables and folktales, and determine their central message, lesson, or moral.
- Identify the main topic of a multi-paragraph text and focus on specific paragraphs within the text.
- Describe how characters respond to major events and challenges
- Describe the connection between a series of historical events, scientific ideas or concepts, or steps in technical procedures.
- Describe how words and phrases supply rhythm and meaning in a story. poem, or song.
- Determine the meaning of words and phrases in a text relevant to a topic or subject area.
- Describe the structure of a story, including how the beginning introduces the story and the end concludes the action.
- Know and use various text features (captions, bold print, subheadings)
- Acknowledge differences in the points of view of characters
- Identify the main purpose of a text
- Use information gained from illustrations and words to demonstrate understanding of characters, setting, or plot
- Explain how specific Images contribute to and clarify a text
- Describe how reasons support specific points
- Compare and contrast two or more versions of the same story
- Compare and contrast the most important points presented by two texts on the same topic
- Orally segment a multisyllable word into its syllables
- Decode any three-syllable word that follows a regular vowel pattern.
- Read words with common suffixes (-ed, -er, -ing, -ly)
- Use three letter blends to figure out unfamiliar words (str-, scr-, spi-)
- Use silent consonants to figure out unfamiliar words (kn-, gn- wr-)
