### Native American Heritage Month

As we head into November many teachers look for ways to celebrate Native American Heritage Month in their classrooms. The <u>MCPS Native American Student Services Department</u> is happy to help! With a Native American Education Specialist assigned to each school our district has set the standard for implementing Indian Education For All (IEFA). Our department is passionate and eager to help teachers and staff. We can visit classrooms or help coordinate guest speakers, review classroom materials, and recommend resources and media. While November is the official month on our calendars, keep in mind that every month is Native American Heritage Month for the Native American Student Services Department and for our Indigenous students across Missoula County Public Schools. Consider how you can continue to celebrate and acknowledge Native American heritage throughout the year. Some suggestions include sharing: Indigenous history, contemporary issues, tribal language and stories, and notable Indigenous people throughout the year.

### The Truth About Thanksgiving

Thanksgiving has been celebrated as a holiday in the United States since George Washington was the nation's president. The holiday gained popularity over time as a time to give thanks, celebrate the fall harvest, and commemorate the supposed friendship established between the "Pilgrims and Indians" at Plymouth Plantation. The problem is that the story of the "first Thanksgiving" is a fabricated and romanticized version of history that ignores the truth about the genocide and forced removal of Indigenous people in the United States.

In classrooms across the country, and possibly within our own district children learn this false history and even re-enact the events with students dressing up and playing the parts of "pilgrims" and

"Indians." When this happens not only are students misinformed but they are playing out stereotypes of Native American people. We strongly discourage these types of lessons and activities in any classroom.

Instead, we would like to encourage teachers to learn about and teach the true history of Thanksgiving or refocus their November lesson plans to topics like gratitude, food sovereignty, and Native American history and culture. #### Oki Niksookoowaaksiiksi,

I am the NA Specialist for CS Porter, Washington Middle School and Hellgate High. I host an in-person lunch gathering at each school throughout the week. I have been monitoring grades and attendance of the students at these schools.

I have noticed that there are a number of our students that are "chronically absent," based on the Infinite Campus system. I know that the NA community has and is still being hit hard by the Coronavirus. The ones that have been absent I just check on them, email or visit, encouraging them to try and be there at the school. Absenteeism has a huge effect on the students' grades, so we are seeing that lead to other things such as mental/emotional problems, somethings that I as a NA Specialist is not equipped for. I am doing my best by trying to get them help, telling them about the services available, All Nations, School, and other places that can help them deal with what is going on in the world. We are still in the midst of a pandemic, and it is taking a toll on everyone.

This month, Native American Heritage, I have been telling oral stories and doing Blackfoot language lessons. I have shown a few videos as well as to what NAHM is today and ask, "How do you feel as a NA?" They do have some great/creative answers. In the evenings I have started a basketball open gym, with help from the Native Connections of All Nations. I am hoping to field a team of 6-8 girls' and boys' teams in the local youth tournaments. The High School students are present as well. They are using the Gym time as preparation to "try-outs" and the upcoming season.

I am the point person for the December event. Initially I wanted to have a mini-powwow but as I was back home last weekend I seen the death toll first hand that we are still experiencing. I think having an in-person event would not be wise during this time. I will try and come up with something soon. Other than that, we continue to move forward doing the best we can.

Good day everyone. Here is my mini-update:

At Hawthorne Elementary, we are getting used to a new read aloud routine called Rounds. Each time I meet with classes for read aloud, I get to hear from each student. This allows me to gauge information the students already know on a given topic, as well as what they are curious about. These little ones also get to practice introducing themselves, speaking clearly to a group, and listening respectfully.

At Big Sky, students have organized 2 groups. Each regular Thursday morning, students are welcome to join me in the Aux Gym, 9:00-10:25. Here I offer homework/missing work check, healthy snacks, a welcoming routine, and, of course, basketball. We also meet bi-weekly for a statewide Native Youth Leadership group called RISE. Students learn leadership skills like public speaking, planning, and running meetings, as well as self-advocacy and self-efficacy. I am available at BSHS, room 11, Wednesday and Thursday. We have our own space for students to utilize in any way they need to be successful at school.

At Willard Alternative High School, we have already had numerous awesome projects. We attended the Public Land Law Conference at UM Law School, online of course. We also attend RISE bi-weekly; we will begin to meet every Tuesday morning for a welcoming routine. I am new to Willard; I am looking forward to learning about the students and bringing them exciting programs to help with engagement.

At this time in history, given the flux event we are experiencing, my focus is on pro-social activities, selfesteem, and belonging. All programs are student driven and student led. Our youth are the experts of their own experience. I believe all students are capable of greatness; when they believe in themselves, anything is possible.

#### Tansi! Hello!

Things are moving right along with lots of changes so far this school year! We are so happy to have our newest specialist join the team. My role has changed a bit for the school year as well. I am now working as a part time Native American Specialist and part time Social Worker for the Native American Student Services Department. I'm feeling optimistic about this opportunity to be of support to our department, our students, and their families.

My background is in social work with degrees in both social work and psychology from the University of Montana. I have been an advocate for families in our community for the last decade. Prior to joining the MCPS crew I worked at the YWCA Missoula for several years as the Emergency Housing Program Coordinator where I worked with families experiencing homelessness and housing instability and survivors of domestic violence. I also worked for several years at Women's Opportunity & Resource Development (WORD) as a Family Advocate and briefly for the State of Montana in the Office of Public Assistance. My experience has given me a vast knowledge of community resources. I'm always happy to help families who need assistance in navigating these systems.

Because of this change in my role, I have had to reduce the number of schools I am assigned to as a Native American Education Specialist. I continue to be the specialist assigned to Rattlesnake Elementary School and have joined the team at Paxson Elementary School. I have started classroom read aloud visits with the Kindergarten, 1st, and 2nd grade classrooms at both of these schools. So far this year I have read "Awasis and the World-Famous Bannock" and "We Are Grateful."

I am not hosting in person lunch gatherings at this time but will be visiting with students during lunch and lunch recess. I will be reaching out to parents and guardians over the next few weeks to check in and introduce myself to Paxson families. I look forward to getting to know you all!
