

MCPS Board Chairperson, Wilena Old Person, spoke about the importance of representation of our Indigenous students in MCPS buildings.

I hope you all had a great school year and send my best wishes for a happy and healthy summer break!







Á aaa, oki! by Chayse Buckskin


Oki,

Below is what we have been up to:



- At Willard, students traveled to Diamond 4D ranch to participate in a Blackfeet Buffalo Ceremony. Students participated in the offering ceremony and gutting and skinning. We learned about many of the countless uses of the Buffalo. There were many lessons in gratitude and appreciations for many of the comforts we take for granted.
- RISE A statewide youth group who organized and facilitated a Native Youth Conference. Students have been meeting virtually, bi-weekly for over a year. Through RISE, students have learned about organizing, facilitating, public speaking, and professional meeting form. Students have gained so much confidence in leadership as well as a sense of belonging and positive self-image.
- Morning Circles BSHS students meet weekly to play some basketball, check in on their assignments, and check in with one another through a talking circle. Students look forward to this time to refresh, reflect, and look ahead.

MCPS Native American families represent 49 distinct, unique, and beautiful Tribal Nations. While there is great diversity among each sovereign tribe in their languages, cultures, histories, and governments, one thing we agree on is we are all rooted in gratitude. With that, I would like to express my gratitude to all my colleagues for showing students caring, support, and guidance this school year.
