

Update from our IEFA Coach

I started in this role on November 1. My primary responsibilities are curriculum development and staff development. One of my first actions after starting was to survey our teaching staff on their perceived successes and challenges with using Indian Ed for All in their classrooms in order to set a direction for curriculum materials to create and to guide my initial round of staff professional development trainings.



By and large, the biggest challenges voiced by our teachers is, first, a lack of time to access and prepare resources and plan with their grade level or school-wide team and, second, feeling scared, intimidated or unprepared to teach about a culture that is not their own.

To address the "not enough time" challenge, I've begun hosting a monthly work session for teachers to have structured time to access and work on IEFA resources, or plan with their grade level team, while also getting PIR credits (which are required by the district and OPI for license renewal). To help with the "feeling intimated" challenge, I've invited knowledge keepers and content experts to join me at these work sessions to serve as content consultants so that teachers can feel like they worked with an expert and have, for lack of better words, a seal of approval on their lessons. Matt Bell joined me for January's session, and will be coming back again in April. Members of our Teacher Clarity cohort are assisting this month, Dr. Anna East is joining me in March, and Kim Quigley is tentatively joining me in May. We had 11 people come in December, 2 in January (which was hindered by a winter storm), and we had 11 signed up in February.

Additional staff development includes IEFA Level 1: Introduction to IEFA and IEFA Level 2: The Essential Understandings, with plans to repeat these again this school year and multiple times next school year. Finally, the staggering majority of teachers who responded to the survey self-reported "some to no knowledge about Montana's tribes and history". As such, I'm looking for ways to build knowledge in this area. I'm hosting a blended online and in-person course about the history and significance of powwows, and I'll be taking a group of teachers to the Kyiyo Powwow in April. I'm also working to secure funding for a Montana Tribal History book study to run over the next few years.

Turning to content and curriculum development, I've been meeting, by request, with teachers K-12 to develop materials and finetune lessons. Per the survey results and a review of resources, the biggest content needs are in the areas of Math, Science and Classroom Community, though teachers would like to see standards-aligned lessons across all content areas. I'm working through those gaps in available resources and building lessons and unit to close those gaps, then asking teachers to pilot the lessons for me in their classrooms. Lessons will be posted on the MCPS website.

So, as you can see, all elements of my work right now are around content creation, whether its professional development materials or classroom lessons, balanced by days in the schools doing our K-5 presentations or coaching teachers. I always love feedback and ideas, so please send them my way.
