I m a member of the Navajo tribe and I grew up on the Navajo Nation in New Mexico. I graduated from the University of Montana in 2014 with my BA in Journalism and worked at newspapers in Arizona and Idaho covering tribes in those areas before moving back to Missoula.

This is my second school year with the district as a Native American Specialist in the Indian Education Department and I m excited to be back working with the students. This year students have worked on a Blackfeet language book about animals. They learned how to say animal names in English and Blackfeet. They ve also started working on ledger art and really enjoy learning about the history of ledger art as well as creating their own.

At Hawthorne I m able to work with the journalism program where fourth and fifth graders are encouraged to tell stories about their school and their community. Once they are assigned a story they get it done quick and with care. It s amazing to see how quickly they put out stories and how well they cover their school events.

In addition to lunch visits, I also do the read aloud program with grades K-2nd. I ll go into the classroom and read a variety of Native American stories and afterward students will have an opportunity to discuss the book and ask questions.

The Indian Education Department also holds many events throughout the school year and we hope to see you all there. I look forward to meeting you and working with the students.

### TSA NII TA PII WA (What's happening) by Ray Kingfisher

#### Oki Niiksookoowaaksii,

The weather is colder now, so make sure your students have the proper gear to keep warm. We will be looking for coat, sweater, hat and glove donations to try to help during this time.

With that, there are so many good things going on at this time. Dana Kingfisher, Missoula Urban Indian Health Center (MUIHC) Alcohol/Tobacco prevention specialist, and myself are collaborating on a new project, The Missoula Native Youth Council (MNYC). So far, we held nominations and an election establishing some bright young minds to hold office and school representative positions. We will begin to getting this off the ground shortly. The Council is a



student-run organization to establish a collaborative voice for Native American students that live and attend the Missoula schools. There will be meetings scheduled throughout the upcoming months. The youth council students will be deciding what to do in the near future. They will be looking for volunteer and fundraising opportunities in the community. All are welcome to attend the MNYC meetings.

At CS Porter Middle School, we finished the Student Trauma and Resiliency (STAR) curriculum with MUIHC. This was good education about how students can deal with emotions, anger, fear, and anxieties. Students learned to make good choices, talk to someone about problems, and change their outlook on a situation. They also learned about breathing techniques and useful practices to help cope with life s difficulties. We are now learning about Montana Tribes and reservations. This is an important lesson, as most of the students do not know how many tribes and reservations (location) are in Montana. I hope what I have introduced and the map that the students worked on will give them a sense of tribal awareness. We will continue with treaties and how the reservations were established.

At Meadow Hill Middle School, the students and I started with Montana Tribes, venturing into treaties and reservations. During this time, many stereotypes began to come up about Native Americans. One of the stereotypes was that Native Americans get a free check, a Rez Check, every month. I had to debunk this belief right away. The treaty lesson I talked about was good, but our library has acquired the new film, years: Elouise Cobell, a Woman and Her Fight for Justice. This film was such a great tool to use the Rez Check belief. The students watched it intensely and had questions. The movie was sad, but ultimately the film was good. I asked, Do Native Americans get a free check every month? and the answer was a definitive NO.

At Sentinel High School, the students and I began looking at current events. At that time, the Las Vegas shooting occurred. I asked students what they heard about the tragedy and what they thought about it. I kept hearing that it was the largest mass shooting in modern U.S. history. I said, Well, let s look at a few things and we will decide by Christmas break if you still think that. We then studied the Pikunii and the Baker/Bear River Massacre where 200+ Piegan, mostly women and children, were killed on the banks of the Marias. Next, the Sand Creek Massacre, where 170 Cheyenne and Arapaho were killed as they waved the white (peace) and American flags. Stereotypes began to arise again, so we switched gears and viewed the Elouise Cobell film. A couple of teachers were curious about the things we were learning, so we invited them in to learn also.

At Washington Middle School, the students and I began a project making moccasins. MUIHC s Alcohol/Tobacco Prevention Specialist will be joining us for the next five weeks, bringing education to the students. I believe that, at this age, these students need awareness that tobacco and alcohol are dangerous and that they will be approached to try it. I will move on to Montana tribes and reservations soon.
