Is it already the end of the school year? It went by fast, as it always does. I hope you have some excitement planned for the summer or that you get that well-deserved rest. I am grateful to have served Missoula County Public School's students, staff, and families for another year.

I served Jefferson Preschool, Hawthorne Elementary, and Cold Springs Elementary, offering our Read Aloud Program for those schools.

At Jefferson, I have been reading books by Lorraine Adams, such as *New Slippers (Moccasins)*, *The Powwow, The Dreamcatcher, The Eagle*, and *My Kokum Called Today.* Ms. Adams writes stories for preschool and kindergarten kids. When we read the story, we often stop and talk about the book. I also have Native American coloring pages for the kids so they can color and listen to a story.

At Hawthorne Elementary and Cold Springs Elementary Native American Lunch Clubs, we read books, such as *The Mud Pony* by Caron Lee Cohen, Beardream by Will Hobbs and *Grandmother's Dreamcatcher* by Stacey Schuett. We also made dreamcatchers and played the Native game called doubleball.

The books I have read for our Read Aloud Program are: *Where Did You Get Your Moccasins* by Harriet Peck Taylor, *Eagle Feather-An Honor* by Ferguson Plan, *Jingle Dancer* by Iris Loewen, *Coyote and the Sky* by Emmett "Schkeme" Garcia, *Raccoon's Last Race* by Joseph and James Bruchac, *Red Parka Mary* by Peter Eyvinson, *Turtle's Race with Beaver* by Joseph Bruchac, *How Chipmunk Got His Stripes* by Joseph and James Bruchac, *Coyote Steals the Blanket* by Janet Stevens, *Through the Eyes of the Eagle* and *Knees Lifted High* by Georgia Perez, *The Buffalo and the Boat* by Kayo Bad Heart Bull, and *Beardream* by Will Hobbs. I also showed and explained videos of the different types of Native American dances and taught the kids how to round dance, just in time to attend our Halloween Round Dance and our Native Youth Powwow on April 1.

## **REMINDER! PASS THE WORD AROUND!** Kindergarten Registration for Fall 2017

Kindergarten registration took place from March 6 to April 14. If you have *NOT* signed your child up for kindergarten, please do so as soon as possible.

Children must be age 5 on or before September 10, 2016. You are encouraged to visit your neighborhood school to enroll BEFORE the end of the school year. Paperwork

you need: a current immunization record, copy of the child's birth certificate and two forms of address verification such as a phone bill, utility bill, lease agreement, etc. at the time of registration.

# Montana Tribal Flag Ceremonies

Our department has held tribal flag ceremonies in the following schools this year: Sentinel High School, Lowell Elementary, and Cold Springs Elementary. We have eight (8) Montana tribal flags for each school in the MCPS district. The presentation of tribal flags will be completed next year.









Oki Niikssokowaaksi (hello, my relatives),

We have been a busy bunch of people over here at the Indian Education Department. The school year flew by once the holiday season ended. Now that springtime is here, the students are becoming restless and are ready for summertime.

We set out to do so much this year to help our young people. Visiting these young folks in the schools and being there to help them with their experience is fulfilling. The events our department planned had great community attendance. When school gets out for the summer, I will continue to reach out to the students and families as I see you out in the community.



Please let me know of ideas you may have. One of the ideas that is in the works is the start-up of a Missoula Native Youth Council. A student-run organization will help empower tribal youth to become leaders. If any of the students/parents would like to be involved in this endeavor, please let me know.

In the fall, we will be starting a "Cultural Sensitivity" course that will allow us to help some teachers relate to tribal student needs. If your student has run into any problems in the schools, please let us know. This will ensure that the problems or concerns are taken care of in a proper manner. Let us hear of any experience that has happened in the schools.

There will be Kiwanis basketball teams next fall for girls and boys in grades 6 through 8. This will be a good chance to get your students out there playing basketball and working on skills. A young man from CS Porter received a Griz Basketball Camp Scholarship for his participation in the basketball leagues. Summertime is a good time to practice for the upcoming season. There are 3-on-3 basketball tourneys taking place all summer long. Gather a team together. Get out there and play. I will be out on the courts this summer, usually at Bonner and Playfair parks, in the evenings. I am happy to help with any skills that you would like to work on.

MCPS Indian Education has a "Needs Assessment" survey that is offered to the Native American Community. This is for the parents/guardians of our young people, and for the community. Our department asks that you fill out the survey, which is included in this newsletter. We would like to see what you think is an important part of our kids' success. We have many good ideas out there from our Native American community. Let's hear them.

As we come to the end of another good year here in MCPS, I ask that you all take care and have a good summer. We give thanks for many things, especially our young people. I will see some of you this summer at the powwows, grocery store, gas station, Missoula Urban Indian Health Center functions, and "cruising." Be sure to wave at me and say, "OKI," (hello). It is always good to see you people out and about. Have an ik'sukapi (really good) summer!

### Chewing the Grass with Stacy by Stacy Thacker

#### Ya'at'eeh!

With summer break upon us, students are spending the next few weeks finishing up projects and are already talking about the next school year! These kids sure do like to learn!

This spring some of my students at Franklin Elementary School were able to complete weaving a rug. We started out with learning about Navajo rugs, what their purpose was and what their designs and colors mean. Then we moved on to coloring our own Navajo rugs before we eventually started making the real thing.

We didn't have enough time to learn how to put designs in our rugs but the students enjoyed learning how to weave and being able to pick out their own color yarn. Many students were making rugs for their grandparents and others were making rugs for their toys.

The looms were made out of cardboard and it took the students about two to three months to complete. I had many orders for bright yarn colors and it was exciting to see their rugs come to life.

When I wasn't weaving with my lunch groups I was reading to grades K through 2nd. One group of second grade students at Franklin liked my books so much they started their own collection of Native American books in their classroom and even made a little book to thank me for coming in to read.

The Read Aloud Program wasn't only loved at Franklin but also by my other schools including Rattlesnake Elementary School and Russell Elementary School. Before the KyiYo Powwow, I read students books about powwows and brought in a jingle dress, a hand drum and a choker necklace for them to see. By the end of the year the students were able to compare and contrast different stories we read and were even able to find similarities in non-Native books they're reading.

Overall it was a good year and I look forward to meeting new students next year and watching the ones I already know grow.

#### Mount Jumbo Tribal Flag Assembly

Lowell 4th and 5th graders kicked off the powwow season with an assembly honoring the eight Montana Tribal flags. The Lowell lunch club showed great dedication in learning about each tribal flag, how to properly pronounce each tribe's name in their native language, as well as consistently practicing public speaking in the weeks leading up to the assembly.

The students studied the flag imagery and how it related to each tribe's culture. They introduced each tribe in their native language and relayed important aspects that highlighted each tribe's diverse heritage.

After the presentation, local drummers shared a flag song and an honor song. The 2nd and 4th grade students also shared their IEFA art projects. To close the assembly, everyone participated in a round dance led by the Lowell lunch club.















#### Recipe: Salmon, Trout and other fish

Because it's fishing season, I thought I'd give you some thoughts on how to throw something together to make your catch of the day more interesting. I know a lot of kids like to fish, but don't like to eat fish as much. The omega 3 acids in fish like salmon go a long way in promoting healthy brain activity and development, as opposed to the empty calories of potatoes (fries) and pizzas.

One of the ways to take some of the fishy flavor out is to create a marinade and one of the best basic things to have around for a good marinade is honey. Next, soy sauce is a good addition to round out the flavor profile. Along with salt and pepper, this is basically all you need. There are many ways to expand on this basic combination but that should be all you need to create a good marinade for your fish.

2-4 Tablespoons Honey

2 Tablespoons Soy Sauce

Pinch Salt/Pepper

For best results, marinade for up to a day before cooking. It's also easy to make before you go camping and take with you.

Possible additions may include Lime, Cilantro, Ginger, Grilled Wild Onions, and Wild Rice.

Fry in butter and oil or grill for a crispier outside, but watch how much fat your are adding to your diet.

Baking at 350 degrees for about 20 minutes with help you skip the extra oils/fats.

It's also a good time to remind the young ones about the <u>difference between Bull and Brook Trout and why it's important</u>. Also, the history of the fish and marine life populations of the Flathead Lake will help our young ones appreciate our food sources.




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
