From the Principal's Office:

Lewis and Clark Parents,

Happy New Year to all! The holiday break was a long one this year. I know students are ready to return to school and I bet parents are excited to have them return also. Lewis and



Clark staff have been in and out of the building preparing for the return of students. We are approaching mid-year and the halfway point in implementation of the ELA adopted curriculum. In all classrooms, students should now be quite familiar with the DAILY 5 structure in the daily 90 minute ELA block in each classroom. DAILY 5 includes student choice within Read to Self, Read to Someone, Listen to Reading, Word Work, and Work on Writing. Classrooms will review this structure as we continue developing students' independent stamina during the ELA block. All classrooms continue to implement the MCPS board adopted ReadyGEN reading materials. These materials include core reading curriculum and intervention resources to meet a wide variety of student instructional levels. Along with the core curriculum, grade levels have implemented a common intervention time to help all students meet the district priority standards.

Along with the new reading materials, Lewis and Clark teachers will be attending training on the IRLA (Independent Reading Level Assessment Framework) This tool is a diagnostic and formative assessment tool that enables teachers to use the Common Core to establish a baseline reading level and outline a course of remediation, acceleration, or maintenance for each child. We are excited for this piece of the ELA curriculum as it will help us determine next steps in promoting reading growth for all students.

Construction is moving along at Lewis and Clark. We have now occupied 4 new classrooms on the North end of the building, including a break out space that is being put to good use throughout the day. Work is started on the 4 classroom spaces in the North East corner of the building. The new lunchroom space is now framed and work is in full swing to get that space ready for us to use before the end of the school year. To make space available for construction, we have several temporary classrooms located in the library area. Mr. Nordtome has boxed half of the library, yet students still have a wide variety of choice for library check out. I am continually impressed with the safety priorities Dick Anderson construction adheres to as they work at our site. Many teachers and staff continue to tolerate and put on a cheerful smile as we experience unexpected construction related challenges as this work is completed in our midst. Thank you tax-payers! None of these marvelous improvements would be possible without your support.

Please note the many school related events occurring January and February. This is a busy time of the year and you won't want to miss out on the many opportunities provided for your students
