Beheadings, rapes, mass murders, amputations, hangings, the list goes on and on of the crimes that a rapidly growing terrorist group has committed against civilians from all over the world. Recently, the term "ISIS" has become more and more present in daily conversations. However, most people are unaware of the full significance of the word. 'ISIS' stands for the Islamic State of Iraq and Syria. It is a Jihadist group made up of a variety of Sunni Arab terrorist organizations. Its goal is to place all Muslim-inhabited areas of the world under direct political control and declare religious authority over all Muslims everywhere. The organization expanded greatly with its participation in the Syrian Civil War and the help of its overwhelmingly powerful leader Abu Bakr Al-Baghdadi. In 2014, the group became the most affluent terrorist group on the planet, according to the United Nations foreign policy.

According to Amanda Macias and Jeremy Bender, with Business Insider, it is estimated that ISIS brings in up to \$12 million a month in the Iraqi city of Mosul through extortion and other illegal



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sales. Another \$1-3 million is said to be collected through the illegal sales of oil to neighboring territories on a daily basis. In 2013, ISIS held close connections with the widely known terrorist group, Al-Qaeda. However, after an extensive power struggle in February, Al-Qaeda cut all ties with ISIS reportedly because of their "brutality and notorious intractability." ISIS is now said to be in control of an overwhelming 60% of Syrian oil fields. Many places such as Mosul for example, are under direct military control, and anyone who disobeys the dictation, is likely to be arrested killed on the spot.

On August 20th 2014, James Foley, a captive American journalist was murdered by an Islamic militant in a video that was later made public. Before the killing, ISIS had demanded \$123 million in exchange for the freedom of the journalist. The group also released a video of Foley speaking to the United Sates Government essentially warning them to stop the air raids on Syria. A mere two weeks later another journalist, this time British, was also reportedly beheaded in a second video sent to the British Government, along with a video of the victim shaming Obama for not abiding to the warning previously delivered

In response to this violent act, Obama is strengthening forces within the war-stricken territories and another 500 troops are said to be sent there in the near future. In Obama's speech on U.S. response to the Islamic State in Iraq and Syria he stated, "Our objective is clear: we will degrade, and ultimately destroy, ISIL through a comprehensive and sustained counter-terrorism strategy. First, we will conduct a systematic campaign of air strikes against these terrorists. Working with the Iraqi government, we will expand our efforts beyond protecting our own people and humanitarian missions, so that we're hitting ISIL targets as Iraqi forces go on offense. Moreover, I have made it clear that we will hunt down terrorists who threaten our country, wherever they are. That means I will not hesitate to take action against ISIL in Syria, as well as Iraq. This is a core principle of my presidency: if you threaten America, you will find no safe haven."

ISIS will go to extreme lengths to demonstrate its power and dominance over not only its own people and civilians but people all over the world. It is clear that the Syrian and Iraqi conflicts are far from over. The U.S. and British Military have begun airstrikes on ISIS targets in Syria. Recently reported by CNN, French and Turkish governments are debating military involvement in the conflict. It will be a timely and difficult process to put an end to the atrocities being committed by ISIS. Hopefully, with the combined power of the different governments that are displaying unity over the situation, ISIS's entire platform of development will be dismantled and finally put to a stop.

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Infectious Disease Invades America

The Center of Disease Control reported hundreds of deaths have occurred in West Africa due to a viral hemorrhagic fever called Ebola. The virus is spread person to person through contact with infected bodily fluids. Doctors believe it travels through the air when an infected person coughs or sneezes, though there's no proof that Ebola is airborne.

According to CDC, the term "viral hemorrhagic fever" describes a severe multisystem syndrome, meaning that multiple organs in the human body are affected. The body's vascular system is damaged, and the body can no longer regulate itself; most symptoms are accompanied by internal and external bleeding.

In Richard Preston's book *The Hot Zone*, he explains that once a human is infected, the Ebola Virus begins with a fever lasting anywhere from five to ten days after infection. Following a fever, symptoms including headache and body aches. There is often nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, cough, chest pain, sore throat, and swollen lymph glands as well. Symptoms worsen to sensitivity to light and excessive bleeding from body orifices. The infected often die within the second week of infection, although some people do survive. Scientists have not yet found a proper vaccine to prevent or cure Ebola. However there have been multiple experimental drugs including cAd3-ZEBOV created by GlaxoSmithKline, and rVSV-ZE-BOV created by the Public Health Agencey of Canada.

The 2014 Ebola outbreak is the largest yet in history and is the first to happen in West Africa. The outbreak has affected five different countries including Guinea, Liberia, Nigeria, Sierra Leone, and Senegal due to a man who traveled there from Guinea.

In order to prevent the widespread

of Ebola in West Africa, the five main countries where the infection is active are undergoing minor quarantine. According to Clarence Roy-Macaulay of WBS-TV, on Thursday, Sept. 25, Sierra Leone sealed off multiple districts containing nearly two million people. The World Health Organization said, "The World Food Program is using its well logistics to deliver food to the more than one million people locked down in quarantine zones."

United States officials are urging Americans not to travel to West Africa in order to prevent the widespread of Ebola. However, two American health care physicians (Kent Brantly, and Nancy Writebol) who were sent to help out in West Africa have already contracted the disease. According to CBS news, many people feared that bringing the two health care physicians back would put Americans in danger. Since the controversy, Dr. Kent Brantley and Nancy Writebol are completely Ebola free and have been released. Their treatment included the use of ZMapp, an experimental drug created from the antibodies of people who have survived Ebola, along with many blood transfusions, and antibiotics.

The first American Ebola case was confirmed by the CDC on September 30, 2014. According to Fox News, it was brought to America by a man from Dallas, Texas who recently traveled from Liberia by plane. Thomas Duncan is the first person to have tested positive for Ebola outside of West Africa since the recent outbreak. He was quarantined at the Texas Health Presbyterian Hospital until he passed away early Wednesday, Oct, 8. Anyone who may have come into close contact with him has been forced to undergo testing and quarantine for at least 21 days prior to the day Duncan was diagnosed.



So far two nurses from the T*exas Health Presbyterian Hospital*, who originally helped care for Duncan have contracted Ebola, both are trained professionals who had worn protective gear. *CDC* is doing everything in its power to stop the widespread of Ebola in America.

The two nurses from Texas have since recovered, although there are still new cases emerging in the U.S. and abroad. In the United States, there is controversy regarding quarantine procedures with returning health workers from West Africa. Govenor Chris Christie has recently come under fire for his test case with a nurse who had recently returned to the states. Follow the current news to stay informed about ongoing controversy surrounding quarantine, treatment of returning health workers, and U.S. involvement in providing relief to Ebola victims and containing the spriead of this deadly virus.

Save the Children, a non-governmental organization, promotes children's rights and supports children in developing countries. They are working in Guinea, Sierra Leone, Liberia, and Mali to train staff, to provide equipment for hospitals, and to educate people to recognize the



The Fight For Animal Rights Through Veganism by Estelle Bruce

If you were to tell the average American citizen you do not eat any form of animal product, they might laugh in your face, while simultaneously listing the many reasons as to why your decision is wrong, expensive, and ultimately unhealthy. "Humans are omnivores you know; don't deprive your body of its natural diet. How do you get your protein? Isn't eating vegan expensive? Isn't vegan food gross?" Misconceptions like these are common, so here I am to debunk the myths and explain how unnecessary and horrific the animal industry is.

Since the 1960's milk production has doubled, meat production has tripled, and egg production has quadrupled. Demand for animal products has been rising dramatically and as a result agriculture has turned into something unrecognizable. Traditionally, animals were free range and owned by local farmers. However, during the 60's agriculture went from being small scale manual labor to being machine operated on a much larger scale, and small farmers simply could not keep up with big companies. People began turning to big companies for animal products. This shift is called the "Green Revolution" and it has had an unbelievable impact on our food, health, and morals. Big companies now produce animal products on a massive scale. This is highly efficient from an economic stand point, but it has destroyed biodiversity and made an absolute joke of animal rights.

In the egg industry, male chicks are considered useless due to their inability to produce eggs, and companies cannot afford to feed an animal that will not make money. Every male found in the group of chicks is thrown onto a conveyer belt and put into a grinder. Living conditions for egg laying hens can only be described as appalling and inhu-

mane. Animal welfare guidelines state that each full grown chicken must have an 8.5 by 11 inch space. Since the animals are so closely contained, disease spreads, like wild fire, and sickness is the norm for these creatures. In the 1920s, it took a chicken around 17 weeks to reach 2.2 pounds, but since the demand for chicken has increased they are now given hormones to make them grow 5 pounds in seven weeks. Chicken's bodies grow too quickly and their legs cannot keep up, making it so they cannot walk. Chickens that grow too fast are prone to broken legs and heart attacks. UPC (united poultry concerns) and many others state that chickens have more brain capacity than a toddler, so it is blatantly incorrect to say they cannot feel suffering due to their lack of intelligence. Pain is pain no matter what.

Milk production is just as horrific. Cows, like any other mammal, must have a baby in order to produce milk. Companies use mostly bulls for meat production, so how are the females being impregnated? They use a method called "false insemination" on virgin heifers, where they collect semen and inject it into a female. Dairy cows are impregnated every year to keep up with demand for milk. These constant pregnancies are very demanding and physically exhausting. Once born, calves aren't given their mother's milk that was specially designed for them, instead they are taken from their mothers right after birth and kept in separate buildings. The calves are almost immediately sold in auctions. Females are sold to dairy companies, and males are either used for the beef industry, or for veal. Veal calves are kept in crates that measure around 2 feet. In order to make their meat tender, their movements are controlled, and they are restrained by chains around their necks. Around 80% of dairy cows are raised in factory farms. They are kept chained by their necks and remain indoors for most of the day. Dairy industries give cows hormones that cause their udders to grow enormous, resulting in painful infections. Cows given hormones produce around 100 pounds of milk each day, which is ten times more than the natural amount. Due to mistreatment, most cows in the meat and dairy industry cannot walk or even stand.

Even on many organic farms, the treatment of meat/egg/dairy animals closely resembles that of factory farms. Organic farms still operate on a level that is strictly economical, and their animals are treated inhumanely just like in factory farms. Animals slaughtered on organic farms are still hung upside down, have their throats cut, and are left to bleed to death while fully conscious.

Vegan diets are appropriate for people in all stages of the life cycle. Milk is loaded with good healthy stuff, but it was specifically designed for calves (who don't even get the milk), and does not benefit humans. There are many plant based sources of calcium and protein, and animal-abuse free ways to get your nutrients. Even cutting down half of the animal products you consume will make a difference. Next time you're out grocery shopping, look at the ingredients on what you buy, and maybe you'll understand how much we rely on animal products and how much of our food contributes to disgusting, horrific practices against animals.

Rush Limbaugh, a talk radio host has recently been heard bashing Ohio State University's new policy for sexual consent. The universities new guideline states, "Sexual exploitation, defined as taking non-consensual, unjust or abusive sexual advantage of another. Examples include, but are not limited to, prostituting another student, non-consensual video or audio-taping of sexual activity, going beyond the boundaries of consent (such as knowingly allowing another to surreptitiously watch otherwise consensual sexual activity), engaging in non-consensual voyeurism, and knowingly transmitting or exposing another person to a sexually transmitted infection (STI) without the knowledge of the person."

The policy basically states every single sexual act must have consent. According to conservative Limbaugh however, having the full consent of both partners is not how intimacy should work. "Seduction used to be an art," states the insightful Limbaugh. "Now, of course, it's *brutish* and it's *predatory*." Limbaugh then continues reading Ohio State University's consent policy with deep concern and disgust in his voice. blamed for being raped. It should be common sense that the rapist is the only one at fault, yet I am constantly hearing "she's a slut anyways, how can it be rape?" or "her clothing was too revealing, she was asking for it." According to *Rape Abuse Incest National Network (RAINN)* one in six women and one in 33 men in American have been targeted for sexual abuse. Of course men and women are both victims of sexual assault, however, many different studies have indicated that women are overwhelmingly more targeted for sexual objectification than men. Statistics show that the majority of rape victims are women, and the majority of rapists are men.

My own mother has experienced sexual abuse multiple times, so I am left wondering, "when is it my turn?"

Beauty standards for women and masculinity standards for men are extremely toxic. Women are supposed to be submissive little sex toys, while men are supposed to be dominant animals with no self-control. This disgusting view of the world is something we can change,

and I encourage each and every person to stand up against rape culture and fight against these horrible gender stereotypes that persist in our culture. Abolish sexual objectification of women's bodies, and destroy the idea that if we say "yes" we are sluts, and if we say "no" we are prudes. A woman's body is something to be celebrated, not something we should feel guilty of. Unravel the hyper-masculinity we expect from men. Encourage boys to express their emotions, and teach them that a woman is more than just a pair of tits for them to drool over.

A daughter was violated, a man killed for trying to be a hero, and a young woman was stabbed several times but nobody came to her aid. Situations you think would catch people's attention, but didn't.

The one thing that all these cases have in common is someone was there. Someone saw or heard something and did nothing. After the murder of Catherine Genovese there seemed to be an uproar about how many people heard the young woman's screams but did nothing. Universities and professors started doing experiments and tests and eventually came up with the term "bystander effect" when referring to this phenomenon. The bystander effect is a social psychological occurrence that refers to cases on which individuals do not offer any means of help to a victim when other people are present.

In 2009, a 15-year-old girl in Northern California was robbed, beaten, and raped for over two hours outside of a high school homecoming dance. According to *cnn.com*, more than 20 people were involved or were bystanders and watched the rape while it was happening, some even took pictures. More than ten people were involved in the attack, while another ten watched without alerting an adult or calling 911. The girl was found intoxicated, unconscious lying under a bench. The young girl was flown by helicopter to a hospital to be treated for her injuries; she was later reported in stable condition. Fox News updated the story saying there were six defendants; five had already

been convicted while one had yet to be tried.

On April 18th 2010 at 5:40 a.m. in Queens, New York, Hugo Alfredo Tale-Yax a 31-year-old homeless man was stabbed several times after trying to save a woman. Only moments after collapsing to the ground did people started to pass by, some only giving Tale-Yax a glimpse. One man shook Tale-Yax franticly and, after lifting his head to reveal a pool of blood, the man left without notifying any authoract. Grefighters were responding to

ities. According to the New York Post, firefighters were responding to a 911 call of a non-life-threatening injury when they found the body. Cops reported they only received four 911 calls around the time of the attack, reporting a screaming woman, after looking into the reports, they found nothing. There were no other 911 calls, neither the attacker nor the woman were ever located.

On March 13, 1964 Catherine Genovese was on her way home from work at 3:15 a.m. she parked her car in the parking lot only 20 or

her apartment, she noticed a black figure approaching her. Genovese tried to run, but her attacker was too fast. A man with a knife jumped on her back and stabbed Genovese several times. Genovese screamed in pain begging someone to help her, many residents in the building turned on their lights to see what the commotion was. One man velled for the attacker to leave Genovese alone, the man fled. Suffering from several stab wounds Genovese made it to the side of her building; she tried to get through a door that ended up being locked. Within five minutes the attacker was back and stabbing her once more. Genovese screamed once again, begging for someone, anyone to help. Genovese managed to get into the building, but with so much blood loss she fell to the ground. The attacker came back for the last time. Following the blood trail into the apartment he soon found Catherine Genovese lying on the tile floor semiconscious and incoherent. He cut off her bra and underwear and sexually assaulted her. He then took money from her wallet and left her lifeless body lying there. The whole incident lasted a little over 30

minutes. According to many different reports, multiple people heard the struggle and the screams that came from Genovese that night. Some said they didn't want to get involved, and others just thought someone else would do the right thing.

Some might have seen the new show on ABC News, the show "What Would You Do?" with host John Ouinonese. The show takes actors and hidden cameras, and has them act out a scene where normal citizens are put in a dilemma and you see what the bystanders will do. There are so many different episodes where normal people are put in a situation where they can either do the right thing or just turn a blind eye to what is happening. After looking into case studies about the bystander effect, I find myself repulsed by some people's actions. How can someone just look away to something that is happening? All of these victims have families, friends, someone who loves them and cares for them.

How can we be so suffocated in our own lives that we can tune out someone's cries, or walk past a lifeless body? If it was my daughter, or my father, or brother, I would pray someone would help. The point is nobody should stand on the side lines while someone is harming another person. Nor should someone walk past a human who is lying on the sidewalk dying. Someone could have maybe prevented the rape. Someone might have been able to save Hugo Alfredo Tale-Yax who just tried to do the right thing, and maybe if someone had gone to see if Catherine Genovese was okay, she might be alive.

The "bystander effect" is something that will never go away. It has become a part of our society, but something can be done. Making that choice for yourself to stand up when someone is being hurt or someone needs your help can make all the difference to that one person. If you have a bad feeling, or notice something is wrong do something. It might just save a life.

Self-harm has become a silent epidemic in the young population in the United States. Self-harm includes but is not limited to: skin cutting, burning, hair pulling, ingesting toxic chemicals, and interfering with a wound that is healing.

Young adults sometimes turn to self-harm instead of getting help with the situation. Bullying can be a trigger when it comes to selfharm, whether it's through the Internet or in person. Many teens have faced some type of cyber bullying.

Many students say if there was a punishment for people who cyber bully others maybe there would be less self-harm and suicides. Self-harm and suicides have increased with the rise of social media use, ly. said Google statistic. Here in Missoula, there are no known outlets for people who struggle with self-harm. If an individual is seeing a therapist or school counselor, they may be advised to use new, more positive ways to cope with pain and emotional distress. "I started self-harming after I lost a loved one. I'm not proud of self-harming myself, but it was a way I could express myself," said a young lady who would like to remain anonymous. This was just one of many students interviewed who shared about self-harm in their life. There were several others. When it comes to gender, no sex has more pain than the other. Different people express pain differently, pain is still pain.

It's always a good idea to confide in someone you trust when tackling depression. You can take a variety of paths to reach the road of recovery and to help with depression, everyone handles pain different-

Discovering new coping skills, and talking to a professional who knows more about the condition also helps tremendously. There

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are plenty of resources in school like counselors and teachers; they will help you find some alternative activities that take your mind off what is going on. A lot of people use music, art, writing, running, dancing, or talking to a friend as a way to cope. The list is endless. Find what works for you when coping with difficult life issues.

When it comes to self-harm and suicide, take a step back and

breathe. You may feel hopeless, but by discovering new coping skills in your life you, will find yourself more prepared to face these challenges. The pain felt that is associated with depression is often temporary. We are all in this together. Seek support and take good care of yourself.





Dear Editor.

The Willard Attendance Policy has been through quite a bit of change lately, with the current policy being the strictest so far. Hardworking Willard students are being punished for things that are often out of their control, such as a mental or physical illness. It is actually better to skip a class period than it is to be five or more minutes late. Doctor's notes are needed in order to excuse a sick day, which is excessive and unrealistic. Visiting a doctor is expensive, and often times unnecessary when you have something as common and minor as the flu. A possible solution our students have proposed is changing the tardy/absence policy from five minutes late being equal to one class period missed to three five minute tardies being equal to one period missed, and possibly ten minute tardies being equivalent to one period missed for first period. We could incorporate this, as well as changing the sick policy to two excused sick days without a doctor's note, and a doctor's note be provided if the student needs more than two days. In addition to this we could offer academic assistance to students who are absent for more than five school days. We should be able to take one day off if we are having a particularly bad day, plus our two sick days and the ability to bank two extra days. Days missed should not count against the students who are in good standing, and they should be given the two days without needing to bank time. The current policy makes it so we have to bank time anyways, so we might as well just get a contract. In my personal experience, I was almost kicked out of school for being hospitalized for five days due to depression. Most of the students here struggle with reliable forms of transportation, money, and mental illness. It is in the student body and the staff's opinion that our new attendance policy is unnecessarily hard on students, and heavily flawed. 

During this last summer Holley got the chance to go to Cleveland and audition for *The Voice.* When arriving there



Nice work Steve, Ashley and Steph's classes. The bake sale was a wild success in my opinion; you guys worked hard and made it happen. Congratulations!



Approximately one billion trees worth of paper are thrown away in the U.S. every year. That's why it's been Willard's goal to give back to our world and community by recycling plastic, paper, cardboard, and aluminum. Due to unclear circumstances, our previous sponsors declined to sponsor our recycling this year. That's why I sat down with Scott Mainwaring also known as Scoogle, for knowing a little bit of everything in every subject, and found out how important it is to him and for Willard to recycle. Here's what he had to say.

Q: How much does Willard recycle on a monthly basis?

A: It's a surprising amount. I cannot tell you in terms of number of plastic bottles or pounds of aluminum cans, because I don't keep stats on that, but it is a lot. Especially the paper, we have several classes that have newspapers delivered. It just ends up being a surprising amount. So it's a good thing we do recycle.

Q: How long have you been recycling and what does that job entail?

A: Ever since I got here, and it was kind of funny. When I first got here, I think they might've recycled paper, but there was no recycling for aluminum cans or plastic bottles, and I was told in a staff meeting that they've tried it before but the students wouldn't do it. I refused to take that as an answer, and so started to recycle in Bill's room, and then just slowly we were doing more and more of the recycling for aluminum and plastic.

Q: Who was Willard's previous sponsor for the recycling?

A: We had for several years been lucky enough to have St. Patrick Hospital sponsor our recycling which was great

Q: Why did they choose not to sponsor us this year or what caused them not to?

A: That I don't know. I just called Allied Waste, because they were the ones responsible for picking them up, and I kind of dropped the ball on this. I didn't call for the first two weeks of school. After noticing our bins were gone, and they always take them away for the summer, so I just thought they hadn't dropped them off yet. That's when I was told they were no longer doing sponsorships. So what I don't know is if they're just not sponsoring us to save money or Allied Waste just didn't want to bother with having to round up the sponsors for the various schools. I don't even know if the other schools have recycling or not.

Q: Who are you looking towards to sponsor our recycling?

A: Thanks to Jim, handy man extraordinaire, the Missoula Credit Union agreed to be our new sponsor.

Q: Do you think the student body of Willard puts enough effort into recycling reusable materials?

A: Yes, obviously some students don't think about it or forget. Every year we used to do a recycling presentation, end of an assembly or something. I'd get up say a little blurb about recycling. We've even had the people from Garden City Recycling come to Willard who used to do our recycling. They've come in and given a speech, little demonstration about the things that

Q: What can the faculty and students help with recycling at Willard?






