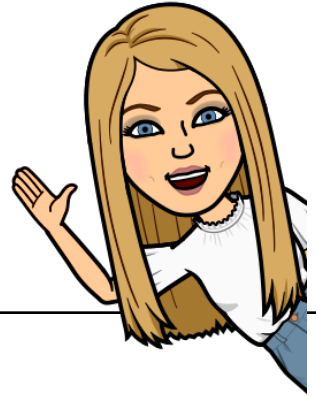


Ms. Brooks: English 3 Syllabus 2022

Classroom Policies

Expect to have some reading homework every night. You will be assigned no more than 25 pages to read for homework. I will try to give reading time in class; use it wisely. Stay caught up on reading and you will be successful in discussions and on quizzes, tests, and papers!!	The ability to write well is essential to success in this world. We will explore a variety of writing styles, including research, argumentative, literary analysis, and narrative. Most of your writing will be completed using Google Docs and submitted through Classroom. Most writing will be completed during class time, but individuals may need extra work time at home.
Discussion	Speaking
Discussing the ideas encountered in a variety of texts is the best part of English class! Every person has unique viewpoints and ideas. These multiple perspectives will be respected and explored in our classroom. Discussion activities will earn you points, so don't be afraid to speak up.	Effective verbal communication is essential to being successful in any career. You will complete at least one major individual speaking assignment each semester to help you practice, prepare, and become comfortable speaking in front of groups

Re-writes

Writing is NEVER perfect or “finished”, only due. Therefore, you will have the opportunity to edit/revise every essay for a better grade. ***All rewrites will be due one week before the end of the semester.***



Accelerated Reader (Red Dot Test)

You will complete a MINIMUM of one red dot test each semester. You will read a book outside of class and take the corresponding test in the library. **This is worth 50 points.** If no test exists for your chosen novel, you may write a test (20 multiple choice questions, mark the correct answer). **Completing an extra test will result in 20 extra credit points for the semester. You may only submit one book for extra credit.**

Extra Credit

I offer a minimal amount of extra credit, so take advantage when the opportunity presents itself. Opportunities will include:

- Reading an extra Red Dot book per semester (20 pts.)
- Attending a school play and completing a 1 page written review (this opportunity may extend to other performances in Missoula) (15 pts.)
- Other extra assignments or community events pertaining to class material as they become available.

- Some sort of organizational system (folder or binder specific to English)

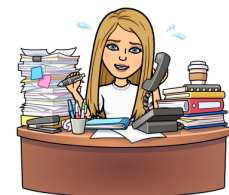
