

Free ACT for Juniors: April, 2nd 2019

All juniors will take the ACT for free on April 2nd. Students do not need to register for this exam; they will automatically be registered. As students complete their pre-registration information, we recommend that they choose colleges to have these initial scores sent to. After the test date, ACT will charge an additional fee to send Official Score reports to colleges. HHS cannot send official test scores. HHS does send unofficial test scores (that have been reported to HHS) with transcripts.

Test Scores

Make sure to keep track of all of your test scores and login information to ACT and College Board. PSAT, ACT, and SAT you will send email or paper instructions to create an account. Once you have created an account, you can review test scores, request official scores, and access numerous resources from both the College Board and ACT websites. There may be times during your senior year when you need test scores immediately. If you are requesting scores from HHS, you need to allow for a 48-hour return.
