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POETRY OUT LOUD



The 12th consecutive year of Hellgate's involvement in the national Poetry Out Loud (POL) competition happens on THURSDAY, JANUARY 16TH, AT 6:30PM in the Rothwell Auditorium.

Students memorize a published poem they find on the POL website, recite the poem, and are judged on accuracy, physical presence, and dramatic appropriateness, among other criteria.

Outstanding performers move on to the regionals (Feb 4-7), state (March 7 in Helena) and national rounds (late April in Washington, DC). Ultimately Hellgate students may compete for a \$200 state prize and a \$20,000 national championship prize.

CELL PHONE USE

While cell phones can be used as learning tools, it is a challenge to make sure students are using them for school-related tasks. A cell phone can easily turn from a classroom learning tool into a classroom disruption.

When students use their cell phones to check social media or text their friends, it leads to distractions for themselves, their peers and the instructor.

Cell phones can also lead to increased problems with bullying. It can be harder to see than other forms of bullying, making it difficult to identify and see what is happening.

While cell phones can be helpful learning tools, they can also contribute to cheating when students use them to access information while testing.

Finally, students often miss opportunities to learn important interpersonal skills that will help them be successful later.

TIPS FOR SUCCESS

- Parents and their children should know teacher's cell phone policy
- Consider the urgency of your need for contact. Consider waiting until a break in their day to reach out.

FLAGSHIP


Flagship programs had a fun and eventful autumn of 2019. Here are a few highlights:
