

Porter (Monday), Meadow Hill (Tuesday), and Washington (Thursday). In addition, I travel to the Sentinel High School campus on Wednesdays.

My day begins before 8 a.m. at my office. I review student grades and attendance and make a copies for students of any missing assignments. Inquiries are made about any low grades. Upon arriving at school by 10 a.m., I make contact with students who are struggling and attempt to remedy the student's attendance and/or grade problems. Plenty of encouragement is given in hopes of sparking their attitude, willingness, and ability to succeed.



## The PAC (Title VII Parent Advisory Committee)

Hello All! I hope this finds you all well and that your children are making positive progress for the school year. For those of you that may not know me, my name is Jennifer St. Goddard. I was elected to the Advisory Committee a little over two years ago. I am Blackfeet from Browning and moved to Missoula 10 years ago. I have four children in the MCPS school system, from grade school through high school.

Currently, I hold the position of President of the Parent Advisory Committee, with Laura Bird as Vice President, Barbara Price as Treasurer, and Quentin Means, Zebah Burdeau, and Cecil Crawford as a parent representative. The teacher representative is Mary Maier and our student representative position is currently vacant. The main focus of the PAC is to ensure that your children are making gains academically and personally while attending school in Missoula. We work closely with the staff of Title VII and the Indian Education Department to ensure that our objectives are driven by investing in our children.

Our most recent event, a successful Halloween Roundance, was in October at Russell School. We collaborated with other key organizations in the community. Other items on the calendar is the beginning of an Afterschool Program on Thursdays through the Missoula Indian Center, Gathering of Generations for Good Medicine. We hope to be providing a tutor for any children in need of assistance. The event after that is our Winter Gathering on December 12 at CS Porter from 6-8 PM.

The Advisory Committee meets on the 1<sup>st</sup> Wednesday of every month from 6:00 p.m. to 8 p.m., in the Indian Education Department, Room B2, downstairs in the Administration Building at 215 S. 6th Street W. I encourage anyone interested in volunteering or with any questions to feel free to attend.

We look forward to a great year and to seeing all of you at our events!

I am Ahka (grandmother) in my native language.

The Read Aloud schedule was started in mid-August and finished by the 2<sup>nd</sup> week in September. Any changes requested by teachers are easily accommodated. There is just enough room on the schedule for 'doovers' with teachers who have other activities on their reading day.

I normally read books from my list during this school year for grades K-2. This keeps me from repeating stories too often. This list also will help in planning the reading material for the next school year.

One school has recently invited me to be part of an Individualized Education Plan for a student. This is a new and important activity for me. I am able to use the knowledge and experience I gained from receiving a Special Education Endorsement for my Montana teaching certificate from the University of Montana in 2007.

## The Teacher's Corner

The Big Sky Native American Studies class has been focused on the Boarding School era for the last few weeks. We have been reading "Sweet Grass Basket" and watching videos and clips from "Rabbit Proof Fence," "In to the West," "Shi Shi Etko," as well as documentary footage from Montana Natives about their experiences.

At Willard Alternative High School, our Native Film class has gone through a number of Hollywood films that have lead up to the 'Golden era' of Indigenous Film Making. Most recently, our class viewed the breakthrough, "Atanarjuat: The Fast Runner" and we're very engaged by the dramatic story and huge landscapes.

The Native Studies class, along with the rest of the school, has focused on projects based on 'Water.' Several students are using their artistic abilities and others are using their investigative skills to create projects that address our relationship to water. Our school-wide presentations were held all day on November 13.

Finally, our Native Eats class has been steadily training the next generation of line cooks and chefs. We've covered many recipes from North and South America. One of our first recipes and learning experiences involved the "Three Sisters." The class adapted the following recipe:

Three Sisters Stew with Corn Dumplings Ingredients

½ cup dried Anasazi beans or pinto beans ½ cup dried lima beans ½ cup dried white beans ½ cup dried black beans

- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1½ cups finely chopped yellow onion
- 1½ cups finely chopped green bell pepper
- 2 tablespoons finely chopped garlic
- 1 jalapeño chile, stemmed, seeded, and finely chopped
- 2 teaspoons cumin seed
- 1/8 teaspoon cayenne pepper

## The Teacher's Corner (Continued)

2 teaspoons chili powder

1 (28-ounce) can peeled tomatoes, with juice

3 quarts water

3 ears corn (about 3 cups corn kernels)

½ cup beer

2 cups diced zucchini, yellow squash, and/or other summer squash

### **Dumpling Ingredients:**

½ cup yellow cornmeal ½ cup all-purpose flour

2 teaspoons baking powder

½ teaspoon salt

½ teaspoon sugar

1 egg

1/3 cup milk

1 tablespoon unsalted butter, melted

½ cup cooked fresh, thawed frozen, or drained canned corn kernels



#### Directions

Place the beans in a large saucepan or Dutch oven. Cover with water by 2 inches and soak 2 hours or overnight. Drain and set aside. Heat the olive oil in a large saucepan or Dutch oven over medium high heat; sauté the onions, bell pepper, garlic, and jalapeño until soft, about 5 minutes. In a dry small skillet, toast the cumin seed until aromatic and lightly browned; grind in a mini food processor or coffee or spice grinder, and add to the onion mixture.

In the same skillet, toast the cayenne and chili powder for just 1 or 2 minutes, being careful not to burn; add to the onion mixture. Add the tomatoes to the onion mixture and simmer for 15 minutes. Add the 3 quarts water and drained beans to the pan and bring to a boil. Reduce the heat and simmer until the beans are tender, about 1½ to 2 hours.

Cut the corn kernels off the cob. Add the beer, corn kernels, and squash and cook until the squash is tender, about 10 minutes. Add salt and pepper to taste.

### **Dumplings:**

In a bowl, stir together the cornmeal, flour, baking powder, salt, and sugar.

In another bowl or glass measuring cup, whisk together the egg, milk, and butter. Add the liquid mixture to the dry and mix just until incorporated; fold in the corn. Drop the batter by heaping tablespoons into the slowly simmering stew (there should be about 16 dumplings). Cover and cook until a wooden toothpick inserted into the centers of the dumplings comes out clean, about 15 minutes.

Spoon the stew into bowls and top each serving with 2 dumplings. Serve immediately.

#### Tips/Techniques:

You don't have to soak beans overnight. To quick-soak: Pick and sort the beans, then cover with cold water. Bring to a boil, cover the pot, and remove it from the heat. Let sit 1 hour. Drain off the soaking liquid and fill the pot with fresh water. Cook as directed.

## Glenda, the Good Data Guru

Hello community members,

I would like to welcome you to our newsletter and hope you receive all the wonderful updates on what is happening in our schools and community.

I am currently working on the Native American data for the District and was recently trained in "Infinite Campus", a program that allows me to review Montana state data in comparison to the District's data. I am in the process of editing the data.

Shirley Lindburg, Coordinator of the ELL (English Language Learner) program is working with members of the Indian Education for All Department to assess the English language skills of Native students. Information from this assessment may be used to support Native students as they learn the vocabulary and sentence structures used in academic subjects. The department is excited to partner with Shirley and believe that this partnership will be beneficial to Native students. As an added bonus, the data collected may be useful for future grant applications.

The Indian Education Department would like to promote a new program called "SuccessMaker." This new program is being used in the Missoula County Public School district. Students and parents are encouraged to contact their respective schools and inquire on how to access this program for home use.

### What is SuccessMaker?

SuccessMaker is a web-based instructional software tool that provides elementary and middle school learners with adaptive, personalized paths for mastery of essential reading and math concepts and delivers outcome-based data to inform educational decision-making.

### Why are we asking your child to use it at home?

SuccessMaker has the ability to assess where your child is currently performing and then it is able to provide instruction and practice at that level. The program focuses instruction on areas where your child's skills need to be strengthened. As your child succeeds, the level increases. It also has a strong focus on developing critical skills for reading and mathematics. SuccessMaker provides real world problems to help activate the link between accessing prior knowledge and acquiring new abilities to strongly develop and improve comprehension. Your child's teacher has the ability to access his/her results and then determine how best to deliver instruction and intervention, if necessary.

With your help at home, your child we be able to access SuccessMaker for the amount of time necessary (minimum: 3 times a week for 15-20 min each) current research suggests is necessary in order to make significant gains in reading and/or math.

### Accessing SuccessMaker from Home

In order to access SuccessMaker from your home computer:

You must have Internet access (faster than dial-up or the program won't load properly)

You must have Java installed on your computer (if you do not, it is a free download (go to <a href="www.java.com">www.java.com</a>, click on Free Java Download, and follow the prompts)

### To Run the Program:

Enter user name and password (see below)

## Jake's Place

Oki,

My name is Jake Arrowtop, a member of the Blackfeet nation. I am a Native American Specialist for Missoula County Public Schools. I am assigned to four schools within the district; Paxson Elementary, Lewis and Clark Elementary, Lowell Elementary, and Big Sky High School.

I have a weekly club at Lewis and Clark with Indian students where we eat lunch together and typically do culturally-relevant activities. At Lowell and Paxson, I meet regularly with students to check in and see how things are going. It is extremely beneficial to students to have an Indian staff member consistently available in schools. I also participated in Paxson's cultural night. Ray Kingfisher and did a presentation on the many uses of the buffalo.

At Big Sky, I meet regularly with the students to discuss various issues. I often focus on grades and attendance, but feel the most important aspect of my position is to build a solid relationship with students so they can see me as an additional resource that will assist them in succeeding at school. I am currently collaborating with the Indian Health Center to offer a tobacco/alcohol prevention program. We meet weekly during lunch. Additionally, I am also a co-advisor to the MCPS Chapter of AIBL (American Indian Business Leaders). We meet once a week after school.


Being away from the reservation for so long has been a challenge and I consider myself lucky to be able to work so closely with the Indian community. I enjoy my position immensely and am extremely excited by the prospect of having a positive impact on Indian youth.

finding out how a contemporary Salish Kootenai artist expresses his concerns for his tribal people and land through his art work. The session will begin with Clairmont discussing two of his prints which are on display as part of the <a href="Crow's Shadow Institute of the Art">Crow's Shadow Institute of the Art</a> exhibition. Afterwards, the class will head to the classroom where the discussion will continue with more of Clairmont's work selected from the Missoula Art Museum's American Indian Contemporary Art Collection. The last two hours of the class will involve a Printmaking activity facilitate by Clairmont. Participants will be able to make several prints as they experiment with Clairmont"s method using MAM printing press. All materials will be supplied and PIR credit will be available for teachers

Corwin Clairmont: Hailing from Ronan, Montana, Clairmont is a celebrated visual and conceptual artist whose decades of work have included printmaking, mixed media, sculpture and installation. He's also a professor and former fine arts department director at Salish Kootenai College. Clairmont's works of art challenge the cultural and ecological effects of European settlement upon the land previously inhabited by his indigenous ancestors for thousands of years. From Salish Kootenai treaty rights to Montana highway development, Clairmont has addressed both deep-seated and contemporary issues.
