

Script Guidelines

Directions: Follow the format below to help write your script. The questions below will also help you get started in writing a script for your project; make sure these questions are answered within your script.

1. What will be said and what kind of directions are needed. (“fade in/out”, shout, whisper, etc.)
2. What is the location of the scene or scenes?
3. What message are you trying to get across –
4. Title of Project –
5. Introduction -
 - a. Lead/Hook: to get people interested –
6. Do you have or need a “catchy” slogan?
7. Conclusion-
 - a. What do you want the audience to do once they have watched your project? (i.e. make a phone call, visit a website, research issues on the internet)
8. Who and what do you need to give credit to? Did you get ideas from your Health APS Packet?

Script Format

Scene 1: Enter students walking down Main hall

Jason

(thinking outloud)

I wonder who is going to the game tonight.

- Dialogue directions and inflection cues appear in parenthesized italics *Example:*

Cameron

(exuberantly)

I’m king of the world! I’m going to have an awesome game tonight.

Maria

(maliciously while looking at Jason)

This little piggy went to market!

This little piggy stayed home!

This little piggy cried all the way home!

Cameron

(exuberantly)

Scene 2:

Jason

(sad)
